Knowledge and Comprehension

- ◆ Knowledge of state, federal, or local statutes
- ◆ Basic technical skills that include keyboarding, research, data entry and retrieval
- ◆ An understanding of the importance of physical and emotional strength and health required to accomplish job demands.

Application

- ◆ Excellent oral and written communication skills
- ◆ Commitment to exhibit ethics training in the field
- ◆ Ability to problem solving in a criminal justice way of thinking

Analysis, Synthesis & Evaluation

- ◆ Be able to think through a process of why or how an individual desires to accomplish a crime

AFFECTIVE DOMAIN: Attitude; growth in feelings or emotional areas

- ◆ A desire to make our world a better place
- ◆ The ability to sympathize, emphasize, or understand criminal motives
- ◆ A high sense of ethics (a desire to do the right thing)
- ◆ Emotional strength

PSYCHOMOTOR DOMAIN: Skills; manual or physical

- ◆ Conduct research on line from valid sources
- ◆ Physical strength
